Out of turmoil can come understanding and resolve. The war in Iraq and the subsequent looting of the Iraq Museum in Baghdad and other provincial museums has increased public awareness and interest in Mesopotamian art. In light of these recent events, the Oriental Institute Volunteers have a serious responsibility to educate the public about this part of the world with tact and grace. With the opening of the new Edgar and Deborah Jannotta Mesopotamian Gallery rapidly approaching, the value of education about the Near East has never been so timely and important. The goal of our docents has always been to explain ancient Near Eastern cultures as accurately and objectively as possible, while at the same time drawing parallels with our own culture across millennia of time. We have great faith in our docents' ability to serve as goodwill ambassadors between the museum's collection and the community.

Tour Program

Docent-led tours of the permanent galleries (the Joseph and Mary Grimshaw Egyptian Gallery and the Persian Gallery) continue to be in popular demand, keeping museum docents actively engaged and interacting with audiences of all ages. Whether school students, religious groups, community organizations, or senior citizens, the Oriental Institute Museum docents are always ready to share their knowledge and their enthusiasm for the museum's beautiful collection. Throughout the year, many museum docents initiated informal study sessions to collaborate on the development of special interest tour topics to enhance their own knowledge in specific areas of interest pertaining to the collection. These informal gatherings were a dynamic information exchange to help improve tour content as well as interactive touring techniques.

The Docent Captain System, which was instituted decades ago, continues to be a vital link between the museum docents and the administrative staff. Each captain's dedicated supervision over the organization and maintenance of docent staffing for the morning and afternoon tour schedules allow the program to function with efficiency and purpose. Their administrative skills and unwavering support are essential elements in maintaining the tour program's excellence as an enriching educational experience. We salute them for their support and hard work throughout the year.

The monthly docent captains' meetings continue to foster an excellent opportunity for captains to communicate concerns and offer suggestions for improvements within the Volunteer Program as well as throughout the Institute. These meetings provide a venue for an open dialogue between the captains. Within this informal setting, the docents and volunteers are able to share and discuss ideas on various aspects of the Volunteer Program. These observations are helpful for initiating change and improvements within the entire program. This year for the first time in the thirty-six year history of the Volunteer Program, we were honored to have the Oriental Institute Director and the Director of the Museum attend one of these monthly captains' meetings. We continue to revamp and streamline the reservation and booking procedures for tour reservations, which are now handled exclusively by mail. This process continues to operate efficiently under the supervision of Maria Krasinski, our Education Programs Assistant. With the volume of calls and inquiries concerning museum tours and programs, we have instituted procedures to make the process as systematic and error-free as possible. This format has been very successful, not only in the processing of our tour/reservation/confirmation forms and fee-based program requests, but also in the tracking and compilation of statistical data. We now are able to retrieve important information concerning the number of museum visitors enjoying a docent-led tour and what these numbers represent in terms of geographic distribution, educational level, and age profile. We are pleased to announce that over 7,000 people enjoyed the advantages of a docent-led tour during the past year.

Volunteer Recruitment and Training
